




Full/Queen: 88" (7x7 layout)


Lap: 68" (5x5 layout)

The sizes listed are just one option. This pattern has 12" blocks so you can choose to do 8x10 layout, 5x7 layout – you don't need to do square quilts.

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Scrappy Variation Disappearing 9-Patch 3 sizes: King; 120" (10x10 layout) 100 blocks Full/Queen: 88" (7x7 layout) 49 blocks Lap: 68" (5x5 layout) 25 blocks **Scrappy Fabrics** 2 ½" squares (4 per block) – 400 (King), 196 (Queen), 100 (Lap) 4 ½" squares (4 per block – 400 (King), 196 (Queen), 100 (Lap) **Background Fabrics** 2 ½" x 4 ½" rectangles (8 per block) - 800 (king), 392 (Queen), 200 (Lap) The sizes listed are just one option. This pattern has 12" blocks so you can choose to do 8x10 layout, 5x7 layout, for example – you don't need to do square quilts. Sew the rows together as shown below. Press the seam allowance in the direction of the arrows. Sew the rows together creating the block. Press the seam allowance toward the larger scrappy square. These should measure 6 1/2" square. You need four to make the block. To go completely scrappy, mix up your colors. The more variety of fabrics used, the more movement across your quilt. Create the following number Row 1 for your size quilt: King: 400 blocks Row 2 Full/Queen: 196 blocks Lap: 100 blocks Sew the rows together as shown below. Press the seam allowance in the direction of the arrows. Sew the rows together creating the block. Press the seam allowance to the side. Your block should measure 12 1/2" square.





Create:

King: 100 blocks Full/Queen: 49 blocks

Lap: 25 blocks

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
If you have an area big enough, take a moment to layout your blocks. It will help you avoid having areas with too many of the same color family. I usually make a couple extra blocks to give me a little leeway with the color placement. Ultimately, you will end up with a beautiful quilt if you decide to just pull the blocks blindly.

This pattern is a great one for using up all those leftover fabrics. You can make them as you finish up a pattern. Continue along until you have enough squares to put together in a quilt. Or, you can just pull from your scrap basket.



If you want to try something different. Use a very dark and a very light for your background. The "stripes" is just one variation you can create with it.

See what happens when you turn those blocks so the lights all meet.



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
